

Aussie Juke Basic User Guide (03/01/2009)

Configuration:

To configure Aussie Juke, press C when the main screen is showing. The configuration windows has several pages that are accessed via the heading in the left pane. Remember to click the *Save* button to save any changes you have made.

General:

There are a lot of preferences in the *General 1* and *General 2* pages. Hover your mouse over each of them to see a short description of what that option does.

Key Mapping:

The various functions in AussieJuke can be controlled via the keyboard. The mapping of which key activates each function is defined in the *Key Mapping* page. The left column is the available keys. For each of those keys, you can specify which function (if any) you want it to activate. You can assign more than one key to any function, but only one function to a specific key.

Audio:

The *Audio* page contains volume and balance controls. The audio volume of AussieJuke can be controlled here and also by assigning the *BTN_VOL_UP* and *BTN_VOL_DOWN* functions to specific keys.

Video:

The video page only contains the *External Video Window* option. When checked, video clips will be shown on the second monitor (where fitted).

JPS Plugins:

The *JPS Plugins* page is where you can specify any *Juke Plugin System* DLLs that you may have. These is a new system that extends jukebox functionality by allowing 3rd party plugins to be controlled via events that occur within compatible jukebox software. Examples include *JPS Attract Sounds* and many others.

Media Directories:

Add your music via the *Media Directories* page. Music directories that contain albums in a *Artist/Album/Song* structure should be added in the *Album Directories* section. Music directories that contain singles in a simple *Artist/Song* structure should be added in the *Singles Directories* section. This applies to audio and video files.

Skins:

AussieJuke has basic support for skinning the interface. This will evolve over time.

Statistics:

At present, this page only shows how many audio and video tracks are available. (after duplicates are removed)

Other stuff:

All of the above settings are held in an ini file. A default file will be created in the Aussie Juke directory the first time you shut down. You can create multiple ini files (with different preferences and media file lists), and pass the name of that ini file to Aussie Juke as a command line parameter. (in a shortcut, etc)
